

# VOLUNTEER IMPACT REPORT

January - June 2021



# INTRODUCTION

This report showcases the impact of volunteers, interns and secondees ("volunteers") at Oxfam Australia ("OAU") between 1 January - 30 June 2021. It shows that most people who contribute their time to OAU live in South Australia, volunteering at the Adelaide Secondhand Bookshop, who donate their profits to OAU. While there has been a slight increase in volunteers elsewhere, the continuing uncertainty and disruption caused by COVID lockdowns has resulted in limited uptake of volunteer assistance since the beginning of COVID in March 2020.

At OAU, 90% of people who applied to volunteer between 1 January - 30 June 2021 were unable to secure a role. Only 14 new roles within OAU were created during this period, leaving many potential volunteers unable to join the OAU workforce.

### So what?

Volunteers contribute significantly to the operations of OAU. They process donations in the Supporter Services Team, research Diversity and Inclusion best practice for the People & Culture team, are seconded to cover the General Counsel in the legal team and build an Alumni database for the First Peoples' Program. The skills and expertise of the people willing to contribute to OAU are endless and with many teams throughout the organisation under resourced, the Volunteer Engagement Team urges managers to include volunteers in their workforce planning.

## **KEY FINDINGS**



The financial value for volunteer contributions for the reporting period was \$397,061. This is equivalent to 5.6 full-time roles at Oxfam.



The number of volunteer hours **increased** in the Chief Executive Office (147 hours), Programs (76 hours), Programs: Development & Effectiveness (74 hours), Programs: Management & Accountability (190 hours), and Supporter Services (107 hours) compared to the previous reporting period.



Volunteers indicated their experience as either 'very good' or 'good' for **93 percent** of all volunteer shifts over the reporting period.



82 percent of **all** volunteers were based in South Australia, whereas most **office-based** volunteers (88 percent) were based in Victoria.




Consistent with previous reporting periods, most volunteers at Oxfam identify as **female**, but the percentage of volunteers who identify as female has declined from **72 percent to 54 percent** from the last report.




# **POSITIONS HELD BY VOLUNTEERS**

# Who are you?

Jordan Steiner was born in Melbourne/Naarm and grew up on the edge of the Yarra Valley. Jordan joined Oxfam in 2018, first as a volunteer and then was successful in securing a paid position. Both roles have been in the Volunteer Engagement Team (VET), as well as a short stint in the Melbourne Trailwalker team. Jordan has a Bachelor of Arts degree in Political Science and International Relations as well as a Master of International Relations.

# Why did you choose to manage avolunteer?

"I believe wholeheartedly in the transformative benefits that volunteerism can hold for non-profit organisations, but also for society itself." An important part of the VET is to exemplify this and Jordan believes there is no better way to do this than by working alongside volunteers in his team. Jordan works directly with the team's administration volunteer.

### What is the purpose of the volunteer position?

The administration volunteer position primarily supports the team with maintaining data integrity in the VET's systems and processes, assisting with reporting functions and working with the team to ensure everything is up to date. The role is a crucial support to ensuring that the volunteer program remains effective and impactful, which in-turn ensures the VET can help all volunteers, interns and secondees contribute to Oxfam's strategic goals.

### What are some positive outcomes of this experience?

The management of volunteers is a two-way learning process. Not only do volunteers gain skills and experience as part of their role, but their managers also learn from them. Volunteers in the VET team have provided a unique benefit by providing their own input and work to make Oxfam's volunteer program as effective as it possibly can be.

# What would you say to another staff member who was thinking of engaging a volunteer?

I would absolutely recommend that any staff member thinking of engaging a volunteer go for it! Volunteers make such a tangible difference across our organisation and have always been and continue to be fundamental to helping Oxfam realise our goals, purpose and mission.
